



PROPERTY TAX ASSISTANCE

Help is available for eligible homeowners struggling to pay property taxes in the City of Detroit. Current applications for property tax exemption should be submitted at least two weeks before December 9, 2019.

Homeowners seeking assistance at the workshop must bring certain documents required for the exemption application:

- Deed for the home in your name
- Current ID for all adults over 18 years
- Proof of income for everyone over 18 years (W2's, pay stubs, SSI/SSD, food stamps, etc.)
- Proof of expenses (current utility bills, tax payment plan, medical bills, credit card, etc.)
- Proof of assets (bank statements, 401k, insurance settlement, etc.)
- Report cards for school age children
- 2018 Federal and State tax returns

SIX KEY CHANGES UNDER THE 2018 TAX REFORM PLAN

Have you filed your 2018 taxes yet? If so, did you get a refund, or did you owe? Whatever your situation, here is some information that might help you this year or next year in filing your return. Also, the tax filing deadline has been extended to April 18.

1. Standard Deduction Increases

No matter your filing status, the standard deduction increases in 2018.

- Single and Married Filing Separately: \$12,000
- Married Filing Jointly: \$24,000
- Head of Household: \$18,000

2. Personal Exemption Eliminated

Under the tax reform, taxpayers can no longer claim the \$4,050 personal exemption for each of their dependents.

3. Child Tax Credit Rises

The Child Tax Credit increases in value from \$1,000 to \$2,000. The tax reform bill also introduces a new \$500 credit for non-child dependents.

4. State and Local Capped

Taxpayers can deduct up to \$10,000 in state and local income taxes. Previously there was no cap.

5. Affordable Care Act (Obama Care) Individual Mandate Repealed

Beginning in 2019, individuals who choose to go without healthcare coverage for the year will not have to pay tax penalties.

6. Mortgage Interest Deduction Drops

Individuals who purchase a home in 2018 can only deduct interest up to \$750,000 in mortgage debt (previously \$1 million). The interest deduction on home-equity loans is eliminated.

CELEBRATORY EASTER TRADITIONS

Easter Eggs: A Holiday Tradition

Though Easter is a Christian holiday, Easter eggs might have pagan origins. Long before Christianity even existed, eggs symbolized new life and the rebirth of nature in festivals and spring celebrations. When Easter began, Christians adopted the egg symbol, but this time they related it to Jesus, comparing the broken shell of the egg to the opening of Jesus' tomb during his resurrection, thus symbolizing the rebirth of mankind. The Easter egg tradition may have been born out of practicality as well. It was custom for Christians to abstain from eating eggs during Lent. Since eggs were easier to preserve without refrigeration in the old days, not to mention that there would be a surplus of eggs since no one had been eating them for 40 days, they were often eaten to break the fast on Easter Sunday.

Though dyeing Easter eggs is a big activity for families to do before the holiday. it doesn't have the most whimsical origins. Some say that the tradition began in memory of Simon of Cyrene whose basket full of eggs had miraculously turned different colors when he returned to pick it up after carrying the cross of Jesus. Another theory is that Mary, the mother of Jesus, placed a basket of white eggs on the around when she went to visit her son on the cross, and they turned red as his blood dripped onto them. Others say that Mary Magdalene brought a basket of eggs with her when she went to visit Jesus' tomb, and they all remarkably transformed into different colors of the rainbow.

However, dyeing eggs for decorative purposes has been a part of many cultures for

centuries, in addition to dyeing eggs for Easter. King Edward I of England is said to have popularized the custom of dyeing eggs for Easter when he reportedly had 450 eggs boiled and decorated to give to members of the royal household for Easter in 1307. Faberge, the maker of those extremely opulent decorative eggs, created a series of Easter eggs for the Russian Tsar and his family between 1885 and 1916.

CITY OF DETROIT & FCA

The city of Detroit signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with Fiat Chrysler Automobiles (FCA) that could see the company making the single largest investment in its U.S. manufacturing operations since 2009 to construct an all new assembly plant within the city limits and retool an existing plant, creating nearly 5,000 new jobs.


Subject to the execution of the terms outlined in the MOU, the city expects FCA to invest \$1.6 billion to convert the current Mack Avenue Engine complex into a vehicle assembly plant for production of the next generation Jeep Cherokee and an all new 3-row full-size SUV along with plug-in hybrid (PHEV) models. Construction of the new facility could begin in the second quarter of 2019. In addition, the company would invest \$900 million to modernize its Jefferson North Plant. The total investment is expected to add nearly 5,000 new jobs in the city.

"This opportunity is unlike anything we have seen in decades, and it's going to be crucial that we come together in the interest of the city and our residents over the next 60 days to bring nearly 5,000 new jobs to this neighborhood," said Mike Duggan. "Over the next two months, we will be out in the neighborhoods every day working with the residents to make this happen for the city. Most importantly, we're going to bring these jobs to Detroit without displacing a single resident."


