
The Pastor's Wednesday afternoon and evening Bible Study Class has been suspended for the summer. Bible Study will resume on Wednesday, C

E-CIGARETTES LINKED TO HEART DISEASE AND DEPRESSION


E-cigarettes are used by 1 in 20 Americans, and according to a study from the University of Kansas School of Medicine – Wichita, they significantly increase the risk of heart at-

tacks, coronary artery disease, and depression. Compared to nonusers, those who use e-cigarettes were 56% more likely to have a heart attack and 30% more likely to suffer a stroke. E-cigarette users were also 10% more likely to have heart disease and 44% more likely to have circulatory problems like blood clots compared to nonusers.

Researchers also found that e-cigarette users were twice as likely to suffer from depression, anxiety and other emotional problems compared to non-users.




