## **Honor Your Mother**

Anna Jarvis, the woman who first suggested a national day to honor mothers, had an incredible mother to honor. Her mom, Ann Reeves Jarvis (1832-1905), was a Sunday school teacher and activist who helped lower infantmortality rates in Appalachia and promoted friendship among families of Civil War soldiers.

At a memorial service for her mother, Anna Jarvis distributed carnations — her mom's favorite flower — to attendees. Her idea to set apart one day each year for moms gained traction, and in 1914, President Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday of May Mother's Day. It was customary by then to wear white carnations in honor of departed mothers and red carnations to honor the living.

Of the white flowers, Jarvis said they "symbolize the truth, purity and broad-charity of mother love; its fragrance, her memory, and her prayers. The carnation does not drop its petals, but hugs them to its heart as it dies, and so, too, mothers hug their children to their hearts, their mother love never dying."



# Preventing Deadly Blood Clots

Deep vein thrombosis (DVT) is a condition in which blood clots occur in deep veins in your body (usually in the legs). If that clot travels to the lungs, it can cause a deadly pulmonary embolism.

Travel is one of the major factors that can contribute to DVT's, because sitting still for hours, whether in a car, train, or plane, can cause the blood to pool in your legs and lead to the formation of clots.

When you travel by car, it is imperative to take advantage of every rest stop you come across to get out and stretch your legs. And if you're on a train or plane, you need to get up and walk around frequently. This sounds simple, but it's your best protection.

If you've experienced any type of blood clot in the past, talk to your doctor about special precautions to take, such as wearing compression stockings.

In addition, taking an aspirin during your trip can help prevent blood clots. Discuss that option with your physician before you set out.

# Tree Removal— What You Need to Know

Now that spring has arrived, flowers are blooming and trees with their majestic beauty are blossoming. When I see a tree, I think of one of my favorite poems "Trees" by Joyce Kilmer.

I think that I shall never see
A poem lovely as a tree.

A tree whose hungry mouth is pressed
Against the earth's sweet
Flowing breast;
A tree that looks at God all day,
And lifts her leafy arms to pray;
A tree that may in Summer wear
A nest of robins in her hair,
Upon whose bosom snow has lain;
Who intimately lives with rain.
Poems are made by fools like me,
But only God can make a tree.

During the last few months, we have been plagued with high winds, ice storms, floods, and power outages resulting in fallen tree branches as well as fallen or damaged trees. You may have to make the decision to trim or remove a tree.

On average, the cost of removing a tree is between \$200 and \$2,000 depending on the size. Stump removal is a separate cost—around \$350.

It is important to check the credentials of the tree company you hire. Because they deal with dangerous situations, make sure they carry liability insurance in the event any property is damaged. They should also carry workers' compensation insurance as well because if they don't, you might be held personally liable if one of their employees is injured on the job.

Their safety training and expertise mean tree companies know how to cut away high branches to avoid trouble with power lines or entanglement with other trees, remove large limbs so that they don't cause damage when the tree comes down, bring down the tree in a controlled direction, and cut the tree into smaller pieces..
